Volunteer Services

In the last week, we have had 73 adoptions (50 cats, 20 dogs and 3 small animals)!!

Simmonds Farm - This Saturday! We are in need of some more dog handlers for this week's Simmonds Farm adoptions! If you are free this Saturday from 10am - 2pm and want to attend, sign up on Volgistics and I'll send you the details. In order to succeed at this role, you must be able to independently handle a dog, answer questions about the dog (information provided), and be able to pay attention to your dog's behavior since it will be HOT. These adoption events are great for the dogs; even if they don't get adopted, they get to have a fun field trip to smell new smells and see new sights. If you have questions, let me know!

Important Confidentiality Reminder: Just a reminder, anything in the Cat Center that is behind the glass is not available for adoption. There should be no information given out about these cats and kittens. If asked, please kindly tell guests that those cats/kittens are not available and direct them to which cats are available for adoption. You can also direct them to an employee if you are not comfortable answering guest questions. In general, please do not give any information out to anyone about animals who are not available for adoption! When in doubt, refer to an employee!



Dogs with Special Diet Needs: Any dogs with special dietary restrictions need to be fed certain foods only. That means if you are handing a dog off to someone, please let that person know if they aren't able to have certain treats to avoid any kind of GI upset.

Adoption Change Reminder: As of July 1st, our base adoption fee for dogs went up to \$70. There are packages that cost more and vary by weight, see below for details:

- Basic Adoption (all weights): \$70, includes adoption, collar, leash, and one month of Heartgard and Nexgard
- Bronze Package (prices vary by weight): \$131 - \$143, includes adoption, collar, leash, and three months of Heartgard and Nexgard
- Silver Package (prices vary by weight): \$198 - \$221, includes adoption, collar, leash, and six months of Heartgard and Nexgard
- Gold Package (prices vary by weight): \$333 - \$377, includes adoption, collar, leash, and one year of Heartgard and Nexgard

As always, our dogs are heartworm tested, up to date on vaccines and Heartgard/Nexgard, microchipped, and spayed/neutered!

Cleaning Help Needed: Due to our busy season, we're asking for some help cleaning our cat areas (Cat Center and Kitten Nursery). You will see shifts open 9am - 12pm each day for this role. No experience is needed; we'll show you exactly what to do! If you sign up for this shift, you will need to head to the Cat Center upon your arrival and let the employees know you're there to help clean. They'll show you what to do from there!

Note: Since you will be arriving early and there may not be someone at the Volunteer entrance. You can go to the front door and ring the bell and someone should be able to let you in from there.

Community Outreach: We are looking to add to our Chow Now Pantry team! We need both assistant volunteers and drivers; if you have a good driving record and would be comfortable driving a sprinter van or larger we'd love to have you join our fleet driver team. This role is incredibly rewarding and a ton of fun, so if you're interested let me know!

Pet Tip of the Week: Heatstroke/Heat Exhaustion in Animals! How to know if your pet is overheating! With summer upon us, we need to make sure our pets are staying cool. There are some symptoms to watch for if you and your pet are outside or in a hot environment:

- Excessive panting or difficulty breathing (most common in animals with flat faces)
- Excessive drooling, drool is thicker and stickier than normal
- Bright red, gray, purple, or bluish gums. These can be signs of dehydration
- Lack of urine. This can mean dehydration of overheating
- Muscle tremors. If your pet is shaking or shivering regardless of the temperature, it could be heat exhaustion
- Vomiting and diarrhea.

What to do if you think your animal is suffering from heat exhaustion

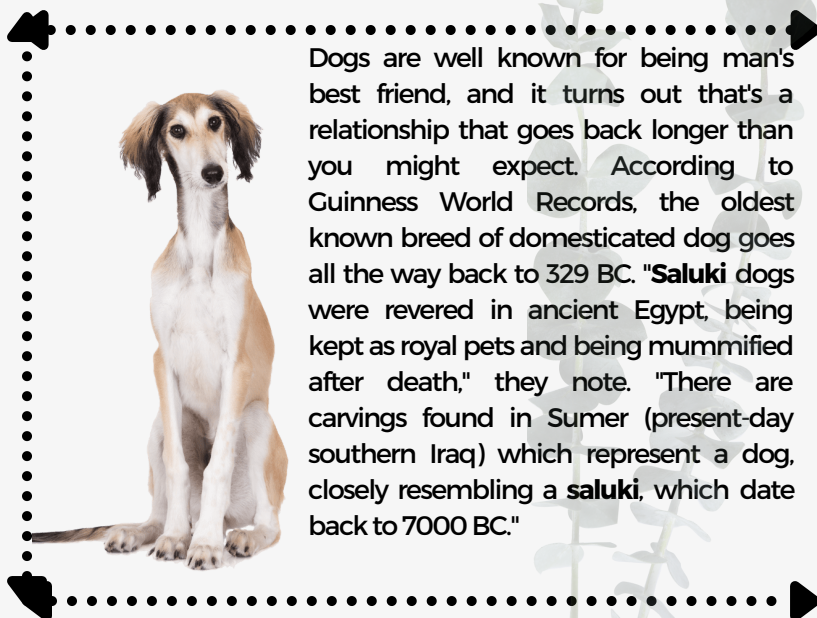
- Take your animal to a cool area
- Lower their body temperature using cool water, NOT cold. Using cold water will cool them too quickly and shock their body.
- Provide them with small amounts of lukewarm or cool water, not cold and no ice!
- When in doubt, call your vet. Even if they seem like they are recovering, they may need to be monitored for complications

The More You Know: Success story from Nevada! As many of you know, part of our mission is to create a truly pet-friendly community which means tearing down the walls of breed discrimination. Many places still have breed bans, and you can't rent a home if you have one of these breeds. Much of this isn't because the landlord is mean, it is simply due to insurance rates. It can also apply to homeowner policies.

Hot Weather! For those of you walking or socializing dogs, please be aware of the pavement temperatures. If it is hot to the touch, please walk the dog in the grass or take them to the play yard. And please remember to keep activity short during the intense summer heat, heatstroke is no joke!



Dogs are well known for being man's best friend, and it turns out that's a relationship that goes back longer than you might expect. According to Guinness World Records, the oldest known breed of domesticated dog goes all the way back to 329 BC. "Saluki dogs were revered in ancient Egypt, being kept as royal pets and being mummified after death," they note. "There are carvings found in Sumer (present-day southern Iraq) which represent a dog, closely resembling a saluki, which date back to 7000 BC."
